
HOME ECONOMICS

Freshman Sharon Ovens finds that curling up in a big chair is a comfortable way to work on a home ec sewing project.






BLAYNE HAAS

SPECIAL EDUCATION




JUANITA EBELING, R.N.






SALLY CHRISTENSEN






The Object of Rotary
