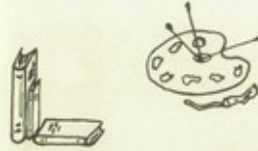


LAWRENCE GRAHAM

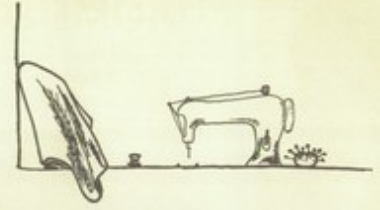

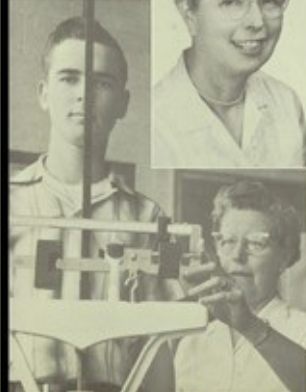
SPECIAL EDUCATION

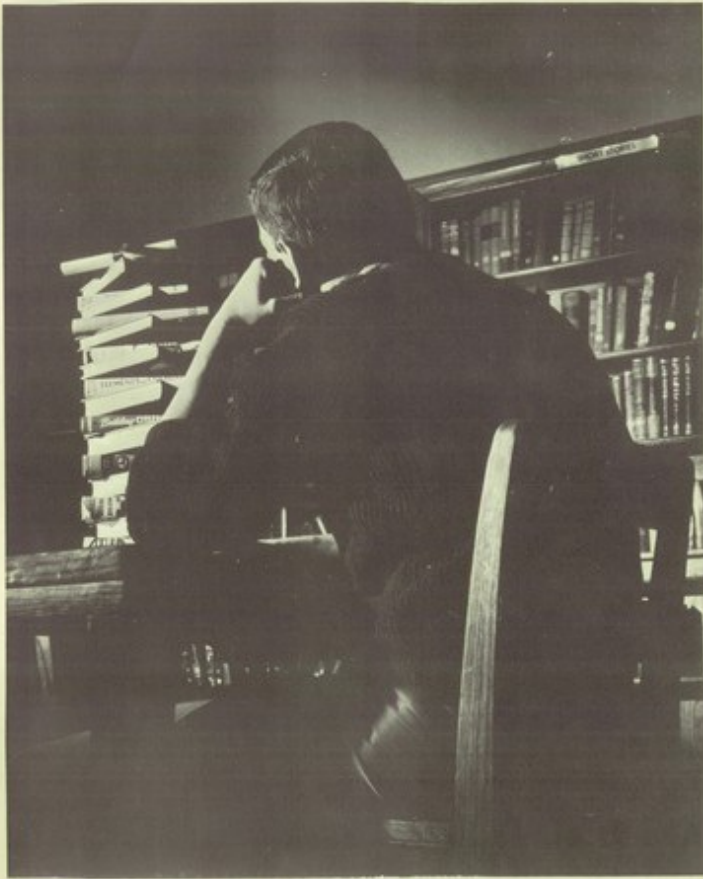

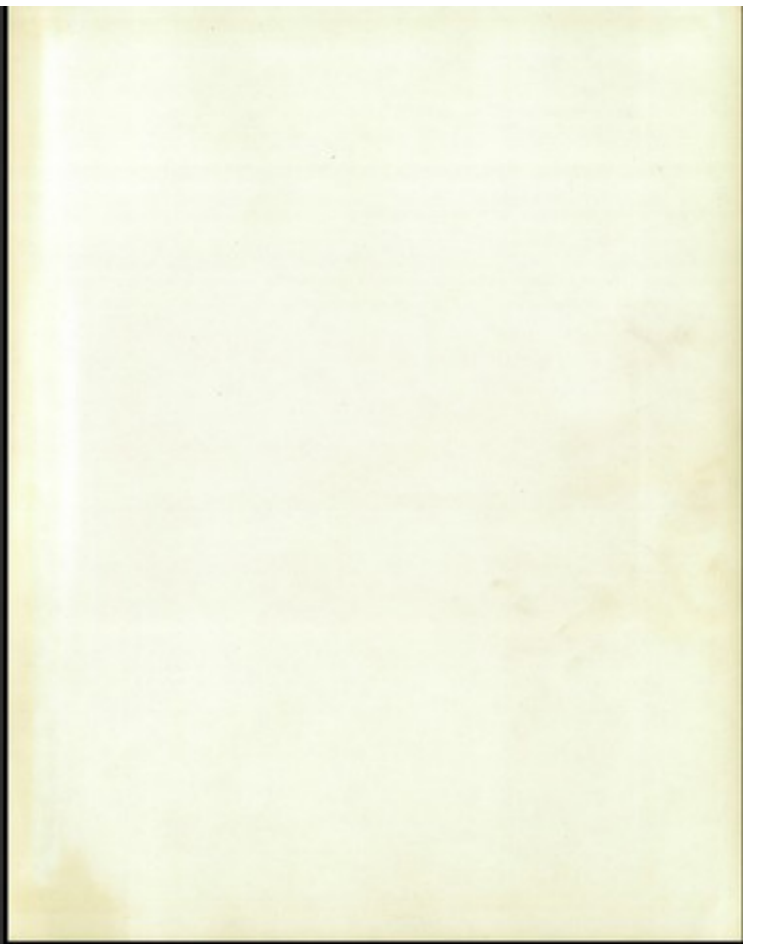


SENIORS

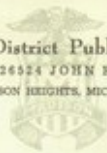

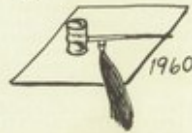


JIM NITZ

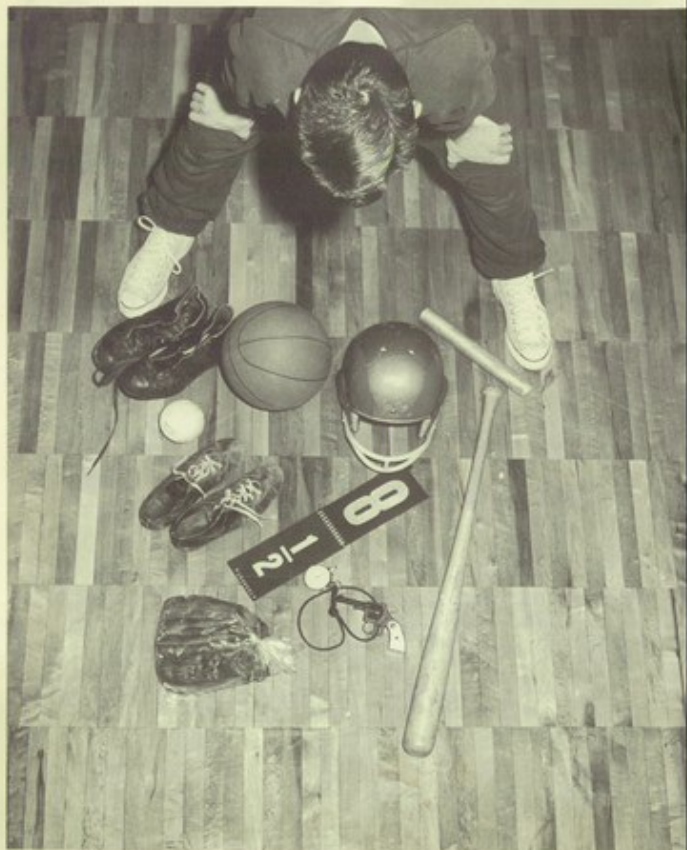

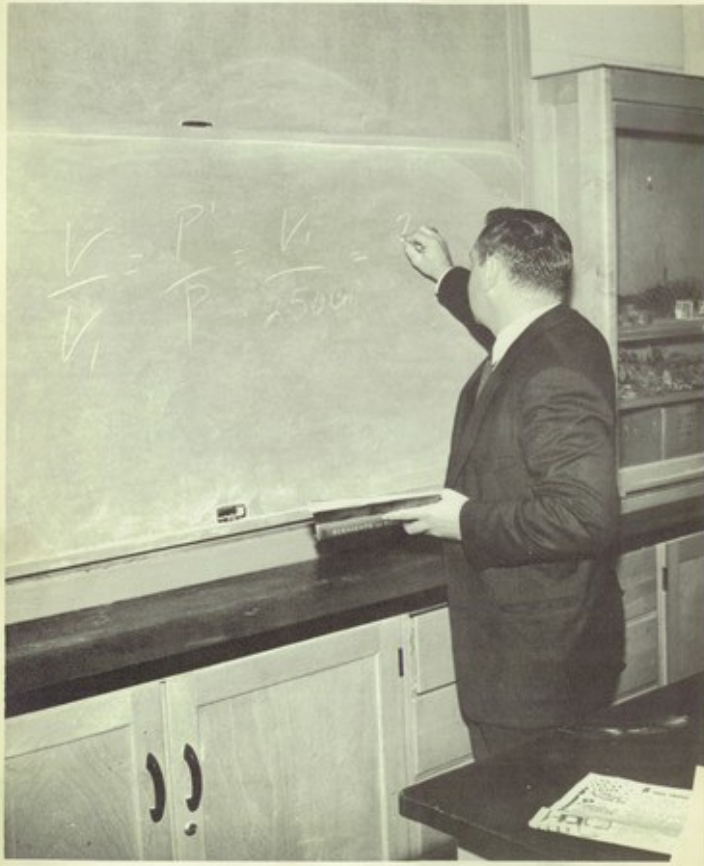
The Object of Rotary
